VIYÙUGHWÀN KAT: Edward ts'àt Elizabeth Snowshoe VÌTSII TS'ÀT VÌTSUU:

Eıleen zrıt Vındèe Gwahjat gehndit danh vagòonlıı vachaa ıhłak eedı'ın' ts'àt vıjùu ıhłee gòonlı', gehkhee ts'àt vuundee tıh gıdılıh gwıınlì'. Vaghàii tih gòonlii guuzhık vahanh vakwaa. Vitsuu Mary hàh ts'àt tr'ınıınjık k'iıghe' vıti' zrıt Eıleen ts'àt vachaa, vijuu ts'àt vuundee kat hàh diik'agiiyahnjik. Vahanh nànundhat guugàa' zrit Eileen vanadhından nuh nıjùk dàn' adhòh ahshn yeenjì' Tr'ıneedlaıı danh gwà'àn akòots'àt Eıleen eenjıt kantrıh altsan ts'àt geenjit ynnjıgwichil'ee ıınlı' nuu t'ınuh. Aklavık gwızhit All Saınts Residential School gwiinli' gwats'àt nìdhìzhıı akòo ts'àt Yellowknıfe gwızhìt danh Residential School chan gwats'àt chùuzhii chan vanadhındaıh.

Au th'ee chan, Teeth'it Zheh gwats'àt k'anadik, 1960 dài' ezhik gwànoo zrit Thomas Koe agwah'aih. Au th'ee t'at chan, Teeth'it Zheh gwizhìt July 11, 1961 dài' nihkhagoothìnjik. Ezhik danh t'at ik nadaachuh au gukhu kat guts'an ahtsau akòo ts'àt chan diti' ts'àt dalàk George Robert hàh Sruh Nìinlii gitr'ahnuu gwìdi' nàgoo'oo ts'àt vàdzaih gijìhk'eh atr'ahee'aa geenjit. "Ezhik dài' dinjii kat goodrìi' ts'àt akòo t'àgeedi'in'," jùk gweendoo jidìi dagidi'in ànts'àt adài' gwànoo nits'òo nihkhàh gwitr'it gogwàhtsaih ganadhindaih.

Dagakank'it gwits'ee nìdhìzhii dài', nits'òots'àt dachan tat adatr'agwada-andan akòo ts'àt digiginjìk gilkhii àhdàndai' kwaa zrit nuh. Ditì' Edward, Jijuu Mary ts'àt didinjii Thomas akòo ts'àt izhuu kat juudìn yits'àt tr'iinjik kat guk'iighe' jidìi tthak àhdàndan ts'àt gayuuniltin geenjit gwiintl'òh hai' goovahaljaa nuh. gweendòo an tthak gàhgidandanh." Tr'oochìt zrit zhùu digigii kat ejìich'ii gadhàłkhanh dài', duulèh dzan gòo geh diinch'uh jì', "Gwiyaa'an giiyeenjit gwichil'ee k'it dagòonch'uu, geenjit yiinjigogwichìl'ee k'it t'agiinch'uh!"

Jùk gwizrit, digicheii kat eenjit gootsuu ànts'àt chan t'iinch'uh. Social Worker iinli' geenjit, Eileen t'at shìk jii geenjit nìinji'adhat, "nakhwanànkat gwizhìt dinjii nehsrijàhch'uu gòonlih kwaa gwàt ezhuu kat juudìn goots'àt tr'iviidinji' gwizraih gòonlih. Goots'àt tr'iviidinjih jì' loo hàh akòo t'agwidi'ii gwizraih t'agòonch'uh gàhkhwìndaih. Aii gwik'ìt nakhwegwitr'it zhàn gòonlih." K'eejit kat ts'àt gikhii dài' jùu didiinu', "Gwiinzii nakhwagwandaii zhìt gohndàii. Nakhwezhìt tthak gwink'yùu gwìidì'in chan ganaondaih."



Eileen was born above Rotten Eye and had one younger brother, one sister and three older brothers. Her mother, Elizabeth Edward, passed away when Eileen was only three years old. With the help of her grandmother Jijuu Mary, her father Edward Snowshoe raised Eileen and her siblings. Although Eileen's mother passed away so early in her childhood, she does retain a memory of her mother tanning skins at Three Cabin Creek and making her a pair of shoes of which Eileen was so proud to wear. Eileen went to All Saints Residential School in Aklavik and spent two years in Yellowknife Residential School as well.

For the first time, since returning from residential school, Eileen went back to her

community in 1960 where she met her husband Thomas. Eileen and Thomas were married in Fort McPherson on July 11th, 1961. She remembers her dress was supplied to her by the church and that her father Edward and his friend George Robert went to Rat River and brought back a caribou for their wedding feast. "People did things from their hearts," she says on the difference between her wedding and the endlessly planned wedding ceremonies of today.

Upon returning to her community, Eileen remembers not knowing anything about living on the land, nor could she even speak her own Gwich'in language. She is incredibly grateful to her father Edward, Jijuu Mary, her husband Thomas and other family and relatives for having taught her everything that she knows today. When it came time for her children to learn she says "...they were very fortunate to learn at such a young age, and today they carry that with them." She can remember the first time her children caught any fur, whether it was a muskrat or rabbit, "It meant so much for them, they were so proud of themselves!"

Today, Eileen is not only a grandmother, but a great grandmother as well. As a social worker, Eileen's philosophy has always been this: "There are not only poor people in this world who need our help, there are people from all walks of life who need our help and it is in us to help these people through. That is what Social Work is all about." When she speaks to the younger generation, she advises them to "...carry on with your lives in a positive way. We all have a spiritual being inside of us."
